1st Annual National Arboretum Koi Sale - Saturday April 22 10am to 3pm

In an effort to thin the large number of koi in the 115,000 gallon pond at the National Arboretum's Administration Building, site of our annual koi shows, ZNA Potomac members have been asked to help catch, sort and sell the koi on Saturday, April 22 from 10am to 3pm. In addition, help is urgently needed to help set up our club show tanks on Thursday, April 20 and to catch, sort and inspect the fish on Friday April 21. A number of the "better" fish will be returned to the pond following some routine maintenance activities and a thorough spring cleaning.

For those of you who participated in the "Great Wild Carp" Rodeo at the Arboretum a few years ago, when the 115,000 gallon pond was totally trained so a species of very invasive and aggressive wild fish could be removed, you will recall how interesting it was to work with the Arboretum staff during this great undertaking. At that time more than 500 fish of all shapes and sizes were removed and inspected by ZNA members for any sickness or disease. This is a great chance to work with lots of fish and to help promote our hobby and club at the same.

The Arboretum will have plenty of labor and assistance on hand to deal with the mechanical aspects of draining and cleaning the pond. All koi club members and friends are invited - and very welcome - to come to assist in the catching, inspection and transportation of the koi to their temporary quarters. This is a great opportunity to see and work with lots of koi of varying sizes and conditions. Koi experts like Chuck Poppe and Tom McKenzie will help you to master safely handling a 24 or 30 inch fish. Doris Poppe, our local expert on koi health, will be on hand to help identify any sores or injuries. Since this pond is only drained every two or three years, it is really a great opportunity for you to help support one of the greatest public koi ponds in the United States.

The National Arboretum's pond with our technical support and input, has truly become one of the top "go to" destinations for Arboretum visitors and is now recognized as one of the "top 10" public koi ponds in the U.S. according to folks who have been to the public koi ponds at Long Beach City College's Pacific Coast Campus; the Japanese Friendship Garden in Golden Gate Park in San Francisco; the Japanese Garden in Portland, Oregon or the Huntington Library in Pasadena. Come help support a great local - and national educational koi resource! Plus, you may also find some koi you wish to buy and take home with you!

WINTER-TO-SPRING WEATHER MEANS WATCH & WAIT!

Fluctuating temperatures and those occasional glorious warm days mean the fish may become more active, tempting you to reach for the food. But please remember, offering high protein food too early, when the water temperatures are still dropping below 50 at night is an invitation to trouble. Warming weather conditions create a very stressful time for our fish. Weakened from the long winter, their immune systems are vulnerable to attacks that can lead to all sorts of illnesses.

The best thing you can do at this point is make sure they have the best possible clean water and plenty of oxygen. Take a close look at your pond. Can you remove as many leaves, sticks, acorns or other winter debris as possible? This is a good time to start testing your water and to add fresh water, but be careful about chlorine and chloramines. Many local jurisdictions will begin flushing their drinking water system with free chlorine in March and you must be sure that you use appropriate chemicals to neutralize the chlorine or chloramines.

Spring is also a good time to add some salt to the water. Noted koi veterinarian Dr. Erik Johnson recommends salt for koi. If used in sufficient qualities, it will kill many different types of parasites and has the added benefit of increasing the production of each fishes' slime coating which helps repel invasive bacteria. For a spring treatment, Dr. Johnson recommends

adding about one pound of salt per 100 gallons of water, adding the salt in 12 hour increments until you have approximately 3 pounds of alt per hundred gallons in your system. This should give you a salinity concentration of 0.3%. Sensitive plants must be removed from the pond or they can be killed or damaged. Salt will also kill some types of algae and the resulting decay of string algae will consume much dissolved oxygen and raise the ammonia levels in your pond. Thus filtration or aeration to compensate for these effects is essential. Salt concentrations like this can be left in your pond for 14 days and then can be removed by partial water changes over the next few weeks.

What kind of salt to use? Any type of rock salt is ok, so long as it does not contain anti-caking agents or trace minerals. Dr. Johnson recommends that you look for "99.5% purity with no trace minerals" on the bag. Also, be sure you get sodium chloride and not calcium chloride, which can be found next to the sodium at some stores.
